- **Tran Thi Hoan – a 21 year old university student, born without legs.**
- **Dang Hong Nhut – Former NLF soldier, directly sprayed by Agent Orange, captured near Saigon, spent over 6 years in the “tiger cage” prisons, today travels the country establishing vocational rehab centers for Agent Orange victims.**
- **Dinh Thi Minh Huyen, interpreter, member of Vietnamese delegation at the Paris peace talks.**

From 1961 to 1971 the U.S. dumped over 19 million gallons of dioxin-laced herbicides on Vietnam in the largest and longest chemical warfare campaign in history. Over 3000 villages and 3 million acres were covered in an effort to starve the Vietnamese people and destroy their forests. Today the genetic damage is reaching into the second and third generations causing multiple diseases and grotesque birth defects. The dioxin will last for 500 years. It is past time for the U.S. and the chemical companies involved to make good on their promises and ameliorate the damage.
